The Yorkists were descendents or supporters of Edmund of Langley, fifth son of Edward III and, from 1385 1st Duke of York. Followers of his grandson Richard, 3rd Duke of York adopted the white rose as their badge. The 3rd Duke was killed in battle at Wakefield in 1460, but nevertheless his 'party' (The Yorkists) was successful against the Lancastrians as we have seen above, and Edward a son of that Duke of York became Edward IV King of England.

Fought July 10, 1460, between the Lancastrians, under Henry VI, and the Yorkists, under the Earl of Warwick. The king's entrenchments were betrayed by Lord Grey de Ruthyn, and the Lancastrians were defeated with a loss of 300 killed, including Buckingham, Shrewsbury, Egremont, and other prominent men.

YORKIST VICTORY. The Lancastrians had the advantage of high ground, but snow affected their sight lines and Yorkists were out of range of their bowmen. Somerset was caught unawares by Norfolk. Lancastrians could not escape, as a crucial bridge had been destroyed before the battle.
